A Scottish Fire and Rescue Service Competency Framework has been established which outlines a common set of skills and standards to ensure the delivery of a consistently high standard of support to children, young people and vulnerable adults at risk of harm across Scotland.

The main aim of the Framework is to strengthen the skills and training of personnel and improve the advice and tools available to assist them in recognising, responding, reporting and recording risks faced by some of our most vulnerable children, young people and adults at risk from harm and abuse.

The key objectives of the Framework are to:

- Contribute to developing a competent and confident workforce who will promote the well-being of children, young people and adults at risk, protecting them from harm as well as improving outcomes
- Ensure that all personnel who come into direct or indirect contact with children and young people, other family members and vulnerable adults have the knowledge, skills and values they need to perform their roles and understand their responsibilities relating to the well-being and protection of children, young people and adults at risk and deliver a consistent high standard of support to children, young people and adults in Scotland.

To achieve these objectives, the Framework:

- Establishes a set of competences to help identify the knowledge and skills required by different elements of SFRS workforce who are likely to encounter children and young people in need of support and protection, or other members of their families and adults at risk of harm in their work.
- Places a responsibility on organisational leaders to encourage different methods of learning and development.

The Framework recognises the importance of early intervention, prevention and response, high quality service provision, leadership and a professional workforce. It is underpinned by a commitment to recognising diversity and promoting equality.

The Framework has been written specifically for the Scottish context and closely aligns to:

- The Scottish Government's commitment to delivering the best possible outcomes for children, young people, families and adults,
- The Scottish Government's National Performance Framework which outlines key National Outcomes:
  - a) Children and Young People "We grow up loved, safe and respected so that we realise our full potential"
  - b) **Communities** "We live in communities that are inclusive, empowered, resilient and safe"
  - c) **Education** "We are well educated, skilled and able to contribute to society"
  - d) Human Rights "We respect, protect and fulfil human rights and live free from discrimination"
  - e) Health "We are healthy and active"



Enhanced Safeguarding	Staff and Volunteers who are engaging on a regular basis with vulnerable people on behalf of SFRS are invited to undertake this training which will enhance their knowledge and understanding of the basic e-learning Adult and Child Safeguarding.  Enhanced Safeguarding is an interactive workshop which provides candidates with a comprehensive overview of how to safeguard adults and children at risk. Candidates will explore situations where adults and children may need safeguarding, when and how should safeguarding referrals be made, and how to work with other agencies to ensure understanding meeting SFRS responsibilities to keep vulnerable adults and children safe.  There are also smaller sections on hoarding and the issues and complexities that may arise when dealing with hoarding. It also covers domestic abuse and Human Trafficking and Exploitation, including indicators to look out for and what you should do.
